



SAMPLE SCRIPTS FOR CONTACTING LEGISLATORS & KEY TALKING POINTS

Why it Matters

Nearly 1 in 8 WA households already face hunger. Now, critical social care programs including the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), school meals, and food bank funding face severe cuts. We know hunger isn't caused by individual choices—it's the result of systems that fail to ensure everyone has access to nutritious food. We're committed to both immediate food assistance AND addressing hunger's root causes through advocacy, awareness, and collective action. But we can't do it alone.

What You Can Do

Contact your legislators and talk with your neighbors. It will take all of us, working together with a shared purpose, to protect these vital supports for people experiencing hunger and food insecurity. Find sample scripts and key talking points below.

SAMPLE SCRIPT: PHONE

Subject: Protect Food Assistance Programs in Washington

KEY TALKING POINTS FOR COMMUNITY CONVERSATIONS

Economic Impact

- Every \$1 in SNAP benefits generates \$1.50-\$1.80 in local economic activity
- Food assistance programs support local farmers, grocers, and food systems
- Hunger costs Washington billions annually in healthcare, lost productivity, and educational outcomes

Children and Families

- Nearly half of all SNAP participants in Washington are children
- School meal programs ensure students can learn and thrive
- Working families often rely on food assistance to make ends meet despite employment

Community Impact

- Food banks and pantries cannot fill the gap if federal and state support is cut
- Rural communities are disproportionately affected by food assistance reductions
- Programs like SNAP are among the most effective anti-poverty tools we have

Systemic Solutions

- Food insecurity is a symptom of broader systemic issues
- Investing in food security saves costs in healthcare, education, and social services
- Food assistance should be viewed as a fundamental right, not charity
